PRR was founded in 1983, as an affiliate of the International Institute for Rural Reconstruction. At the core of PRR's programming is an integrated and holistic approach to socio-economic development that focuses on four core areas: social organization, health, education, and economic improvement. PRR works in over 80 communities in the provinces of Santa Barbara and Comayagua, and is currently serving over 1,200 rural families.

Through education, training and micro-credit loans, it works to increase the productive capacity and self-sufficiency of rural women. 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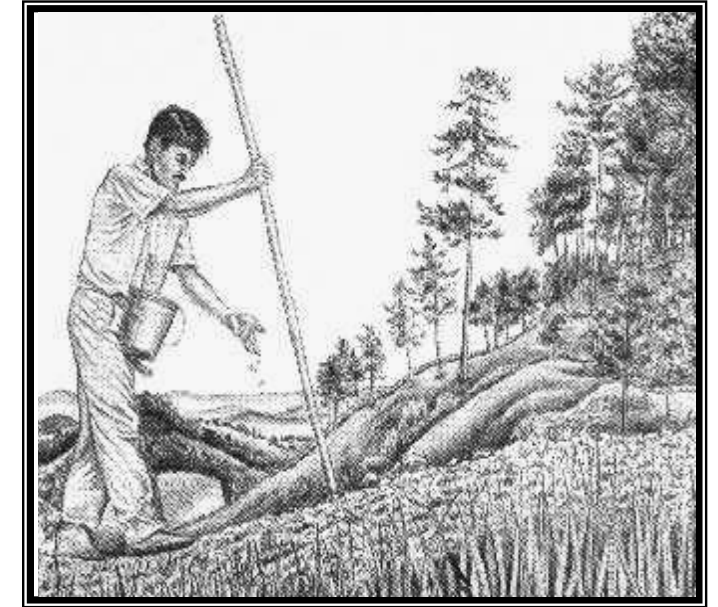

The campesino (peasant) farmers of west-central Honduras have been working hard to improve life for their families. They recognize the important role education plays in their children's future. New and expanded schools will improve the quality of education currently available and add opportunities for more children to attend.



Projects in 2010 - 11

Highlights, according to past travellers

- Living and working in community with team members and local volunteers

Teams

Each team will consist of about 12 people drawn from across Canada who will work together with local volunteers. While construction experience and Spanish language skills would be assets, neither is required: both are welcome.

Anyone in reasonably good health, willing to do physical labour for about 7 hours a day is welcome: men and women, 18 to 75+ (youth under 18 must travel with a parent or guardian). Volunteers will be accepted on a first-come-first-served basis.

Construction

Construction will be carried out under the direction of a local foreman using local methods and materials: cement block and reinforced concrete. The work will be manual. Skills will be taught as required.

Working and Living Conditions

The work is like heavy-duty, spring yard work or do-it-yourself renovations, requiring some stamina. Team members are asked to pace themselves as necessary. Billeting will be at the head-quarters of our local partners. Local women trained in safe food handling practices will provide tasty and hearty meals. All drinking and cooking water is bottled. There are warm showers.

Medical

Medical assistance is available locally. All travellers must have out-of-country medical coverage.

Weather

Temperatures will be moderate: 70-85°F (22-29°C) with nights as cool as 45-50°F (7-10°C).

Commitments

As a role model for the local people and a courtesy to other team members, participants are requested to abstain from consuming alcohol and tobacco in the program areas.

Cost

Each trip costs \$3,000/person including: airfare (Toronto departure), billeting; food and transportation in Central America; and a contribution for construction materials. There may be additional costs for departures from other cities (typically \$1-200 for western Canada), airline fuel surcharges or late bookings that will be confirmed with participants prior to buying plane tickets.

Participants are encouraged to raise donations from friends, families and colleagues. Previous travellers have found that many people are pleased to be asked to participate by contributing toward the cost of construction materials. Each traveler should target a minimum of \$900 (included in \$3,000 above) in fundraising. We will help with effective ideas.

All payments for the trip must be received by the office one month before the beginning of the trip unless alternative arrangements have been made.

Other Costs

Other costs that may be incurred include: out of country medical insurance, immunizations, camera, souvenirs and passports.

Applications and Deposits

Additional applications are available through the World Accord office or web site. Completed applications along with a \$1,200 non-refundable deposit should be sent to World Accord in Waterloo. All travellers will receive a detailed Handbook.

Tax Receipts

Receipts for income tax purposes will be issued in accordance with Canada Revenue Agency guidelines. This requires that all donations be considered final, no-strings-attached gifts and that no refunds be given. If a participant has to cancel his/her trip, then all donations, less any non-refundable portion of an airfare already purchased, can be carried forward to another year or assigned to another traveler at the original participant's option.

Insurance

Participants are responsible for all of their own travel and medical insurance. Out-of-country medical insurance is mandatory.
